

How and where to research a person's individual Military Service Record. Unit Histories, Campaigns and other Military History Records in Australia and the United Kingdom



Introduction

The obtaining of a person's Military Service Records are an important aspect of determining an insight into an individual's time in the Services, such as the campaigns they served in, their rank, Units in which they served and any Medals, Honours, Awards or Decorations they received.

This information can be useful when researching for a Military History Project or for researching a relative as part of a genealogical investigation of a family.

The Military Records of an individual can provide information:

- Records of Service
- Certificate of Service (WW2)
- Unit(s) in which a person served
- The Service in which they served Army, Navy or Air Force
- Campaign Areas or Theatres of War
- Embarkation and Return dates from and to Australia
- Method of departure-Ship or Plane
- Were they captured and became a Prisoner of War (POW)
- Were they wounded or Killed in Action (KIA)
- War Graves
- Medals and Decorations awarded


Examples of information that can be obtained:

Record of Service for a discharged Service Person from all Wars and Campaigns:
